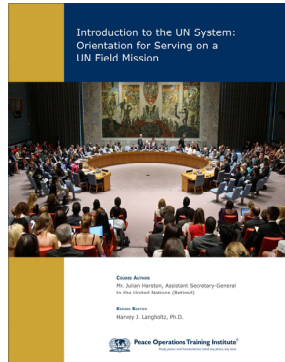
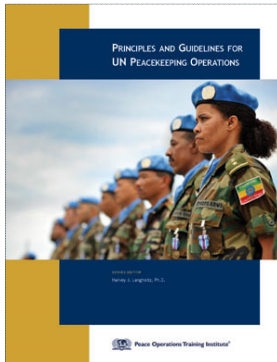


Recommended Starter Courses:

Principles and Guidelines for UN Peacekeeping Operations

Developed in consultation with the Peacekeeping Best Practices Section of the UN Department of Peacekeeping Operations Policy, Evaluation and Training Division, this course is based on the internal DPKO/DFS

publication *United Nations Peacekeeping Operations: Principles and Guidelines*, which is more widely known as the *Capstone Doctrine*. This course comprehensively defines and promulgates available peacekeeping doctrine, definitions, procedures, and policy. It introduces the concept and evolution of UN Peacekeeping, explains the decision process that precedes the deployment of a peacekeeping operation, and then the planning process to implement that decision.



Introduction to the UN System

This course introduces the purpose and principles of the United Nations, its institutional framework, and its active leadership role in the global pursuit for peace, security, and development. The legal foundations of the Organization are discussed, as well as applications of

international humanitarian law, human rights, and the protection of civilians. Practical field techniques for communication, negotiation, and mediation as well as the general obligations and responsibilities of UN field personnel are also presented. Subject matter and objectives for this course are based on UN policy, doctrine, and related resources.

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The National Training Centre E-Learning Platform (NTCELP) is your gateway to online learning. Courses are offered free of charge to all IPSTC personnel.

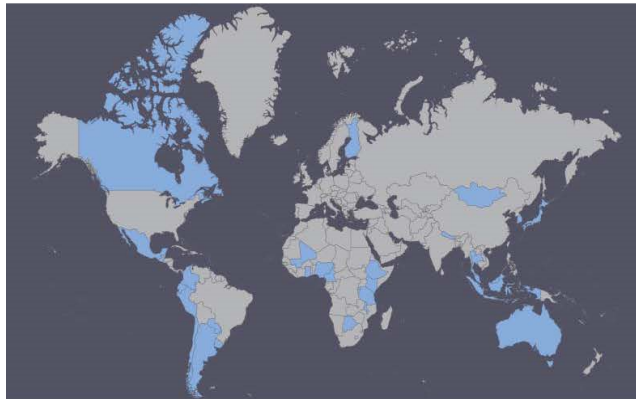


These courses can be used to complement existing classroom instruction and provide information well suited for professional development.

How to get started:

Go to the IPSTC page on the POTI website: www.peaceopstraining.org/programs/ntcelp/africa/ipstc/ and click on the blue **Sign up** box.

Enter **IPSTC** in the programme eligibility code box that appears when you create your student profile (see example box below).

Sign up for Courses:

Login to your account through the POTI home page (www.peaceopstraining.org).

Click on **Course Signup**.

Click **Add to Cart** for each course you want to study.

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Method of Study:

Sign up for a course.

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Quiz yourself with the questions provided at the end of each lesson (answers also provided).

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Two levels of certification available:

- Individual courses: Students earn a Certificate of Completion for each successfully completed course (free).
- Peace Operations Specialized Training (POST) Certificate: Earned by completing a topic-specific eight-course sequence and comprehensive examination. Topics available are Military Studies; Police Studies; Civilian Service; Gender Awareness; Logistical Support; and Human Rights (fee required).
